HUDSON-FULTON CELEBRATION 25 SEPT-9 OCT 1909

The first major naval event to take place in NY harbor in the 20th century involved US and foreign vessels. Some US units, accompanied by reproductions of Robert Fulton's CLERMONT and Henry Hudson's HALF MOON sailed up the HUDSON River as far as Albany.

PRESIDENTIAL FLEET REVIEW 31 MAY 1934

As Commander-in-Chief, Pres. Franklin D. Roosevelt reviewed the Fleet as it lay at anchor off of Ambrose Light while aboard the USS INDIANAPOLIS. From 31 May-18 June the ships lay at anchor in the Hudson River in a line from midtown Manhattan north to Yonkers.

As the ships rode at anchor in the Hudson River, Pres. Harry S Truman viewed the fleet from the USS RENSHAW on the first Navy Day following the end of World War II. That same day, Pres. Truman went to the Brooklyn Navy Yard and placed the USS FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT CVB-41 into commission.

INR NY 3 JULY 1976

On 3-4 July 1976 an International Naval Review and Operation Sail were held in NY harbor to coincide with the bicentennial of the US.

On 3 July, 23 US naval vessels, and 30 foreign naval vessels began a ship parade from the Verrazano-Narrows Bridge into NY Harbor. This fourth INR included the first visit in 10 years of a US aircraft carrier to NY.
